INDIANAPOLIS—The National Panhellenic Conference has selected CAMPUSPEAK, Inc. to develop and offer training nationwide for its College Panhellenics, which represent the student government groups of sorority communities at colleges and universities. “With student leadership in transition so frequently on college campuses, conference leaders decided that we needed on-site trainers who can develop premier training and development standards for our collegians,” said Julie Cain Burkhard, chairman of the NPC based in Indianapolis. As many as 4,000 emerging student leaders could participate in the 2009-2010 academic school year. Up to four pilot programs will be conducted by this April at locations yet to be determined. “Our choice to select an outside consultant for this work for the first time in our history is key to keeping our training standards consistent and of the quality that parents, students and university officials have come to expect of the NPC,” Burkhard said. Previously, the training for College Panhellenics was handled primarily by volunteers. NPC content experts will still be involved in fine-tuning the core curriculum, said Kris Bridges, NPC’s chairman of the College Panhellenics. CAMPUSPEAK, a Denver-based company in its 10th year of operation, provides up to 40 higher education professionals as speakers for college and university campuses who conduct up to 60 workshops a year. The curriculum-based educational events cover a wide range of topics, including recruitment, community building, safety, hazing, membership retention and values-based leadership. In Indiana, Purdue University has had a relationship with CAMPUSPEAK for 10 years. Purdue’s sorority and fraternity population includes 81 chapters and represents about 18 percent of its 31,000 undergraduate students, according to Kyle A. Pendleton, assistant dean of students. “Combining the programs and services of NPC with an educational training powerhouse like CAMPUSPEAK will allow for the creation of a top notch resource for both undergraduates and professionals,” he said. The new national training program is called Advance Panhellenic!, and will be managed by Tiffanee Hopf, director of the agency’s interactive workshops. Hopf’s division has run workshops for the past six years for both fraternities and sororities in the United States. The new program, which will be put into place during the next three years, aims to bring NPC’s missions and goals to student leaders in a standardized way. In partnership with universities, local alumnae and student leaders, CAMPUSPEAK consultants will help create strategic plans. One-day retreats will also be offered to participating groups so women can better cope with challenges their councils may face. In the United States and Canada, there are 568 College Panhellenics based on college and university campuses. “NPC and CAMPUSPEAK share a commitment to give student leaders the skills and training necessary to creatively tackle the issues and challenges they faces—as well as enhance their leadership and problem-solving skills,” said T.J. Sullivan, vice president and chief executive officer of CAMPUSPEAK. Bridges agreed that the partnership will usher in a new era of training for student leaders—one that continues to “provide NPC’s message by speaking the students’ language.”
